During this workshop, we will discuss The Challenge of EMS Continuing Education with Wes Ward & Dr. Will Ferguson. Many EMS agencies view continuing education as a nuisance, and many agency administrators concentrate on the task of documenting sufficient training for their employees with little concern for the quality of the training. The Alabama EMS Challenge program started by Dr. Will Ferguson is an on-going program that is attempting to make EMS continuing education more impactful. The program features physician instructors and is free to EMS providers. The educational philosophy of the program is to provide high-quality classes that are intense and delivered in small doses consistently over the recertification period. Alabama EMS Challenge has learned several key lessons on the design of EMS continuing education over the seven years of its operation. This presentation highlights the importance of EMS continuing education, key lessons learned, the importance of physician involvement, and suggestions for starting a similar program that is tailored to the needs of specific EMS agencies.

The Last Lecture: Lessons Learned in Emergency Medicine

Presenter: Russ Brown

Emergency and pre-hospital medicine is a rewarding but challenging profession. It has been said that working in emergency medicine is like reading a bunch of short stories every shift. It allows us a glimpse into the vulnerable lives of people. A glimpse that's often marred with tragedy, heartache, and death. It can take its toil on us as well. This lecture will be a series of lessons learned in medicine. Applicable lessons that will hopefully allow us to take better care of our patients, become better clinicians, and better human beings.

Breakout Sessions

Educator Track: The Basics of Burns

Dr. Shawn Fagan

This burn session will look at types of burns from 1st-4th degree, emergent treatment of the acutely burned patient, how to calculate TBSA (Total Body Surface Area), and how to identify hypertrophic scarring, it's causes, signs/symptoms and the treatment. This information will be relevant for instructors to go over with their students on a call they don't see all the time.

Provider Track: Pragmatic 12 Lead EKG's Dr. William Ferguson

The pragmatic EKG interpretation course will cover basic 12-lead/3-lead interpretations in the setting of the symptomatic patient. The course will cover a practical application of current trends in therapy based upon the risk-to-benefit for both the beginner in ACLS care and the experienced provider. The most common pathophysiology of dysrhythmias along with critical/life threatening mimics of common dysrhythmias will be addressed in a practical/easily useable format. "Too Fast, Too Slow, or 'Okay-ish'"

Educator Track: So, You Want to Be a Medical Educator

At some point in your career, you may choose to be a medical educator. But having the clinical knowledge and being able to teach are different skill sets. This lecture will cover the basics of being a medical educator. Tips and strategies for dealing with the struggling learner, teaching strategies that are based on cognitive neuroscience, and the one-minute preceptor model of bedside teaching will be explored in detail. Whether you are a seasoned educator or new to teaching this lecture has something for everyone. And with better medical education comes better patient care!

Provider Track: Blunt Cardiac Injury in the Pediatric Trauma Patient

Blunt cardiac injury (BCI) in the pediatric trauma patient is a rare occurrence, however it can have detrimental effects. It is important to recognize the anatomical differences that may increase the risk of BCI for children. Mechanism of injury plays an important role in the detection of this type of injury. Through case presentations, the audience will see that there can be a delayed presentation of symptoms related to BCI, therefore they should be suspicious of subtle signs.

Cardiogenic shock (CS) mortality can be as high as 50%. Often by the time CS is recognized, even the most aggressive therapies can be futile. When EMS anticipates CS early, begins treatment and transports to a center adept at treating CS, the shock death spiral can be stopped at an appropriate time. When these things do not happen, or inappropriate treatment is given, the mortality rate of CS will be difficult if not impossible to impact. CS is best treated in a true system of care and EMS is the backbone of that system and can make the biggest impact.

The importance of these assessments is not just knowing them but also understanding how to perform them correctly and use them. 10:00-11:00 AM: ECMO: What is it and How Does it Work?

Dr. Allison Dupon

One of the most aggressive and lifesaving interventions that can be performed is extracorporeal membrane oxygenation or ECMO. This escalation of care should be considered as early as the initial patient contact especially with our sickest and most compromised patients. It takes a specialized team of experts to

initiate and manage ECMO patients, however, the recognition of its potential need and destination must happen first. From patients needing veno-venous (VV) ECMO to support lung function to veno-arterial (VA) ECMO taking over heart and lung function to ECMO during cardiac arrest (ECPR), understanding how ECMO works and the patients who can benefit from it is crucial. As ECMO use expands, EMS is more important than ever to initiate the appropriate system of care to treat our sickest patients.
